The minimum provision, except possibly for short one-way lanes, is two lines. The majority of local streets should have pavements wide enough for three lines and no more. It has been the custom throughout the middle west to pave local streets thirty-five and forty feet wide, thereby wasting large sums of money, and usually making it impossible to lay the best type of pavement, owing to the great expense. Twenty-four feet of pavement is wide enough to allow a vehicle to pass down the middle of the street between two others standing at either curb, or to pass on either side of a vehicle moving slowly down the middle.
